Profiles of Service

CAPT Warner W. Tyler Biography

CAPT Warner Tyler was the first RIAC in Denver's RIA-5, 1977-1980.

Affectionately known as "Captain Chaos," he was insufferably fun, charming, friendly, and helpful. Unless you noticed the ribbon for the Navy Cross, you might not realize he was also a fierce and skilled warrior.



On 25 Oct 1944, ENS Tyler -- flying with the USS Lexington's Torpedo Squadron Nineteen in a TBF "Avenger" aircraft -- put a torpedo into a Japanese battleship. Braving unusually fierce anti-aircraft fire, and challenged by the ship's excellent evasive maneuvering, Tyler showed indomitable courage and brilliant airmanship. He, his squadron commander, and a squadron mate all apparently scored damaging hits.

CAPT Tyler went into the Reserves shortly after WW II ended, first in the Air Reserve and then moving to Intel around 1962. He had a solid career running his own company and was happily married with two fine kids. He lived 76 impactful years and passed away in 1998.

So, it's fitting that CAPT Steve Maffeo is working on a biography of Captain Chaos. He plans to focus on Tyler's role in the huge Battle for Leyte Gulf but of course will flesh out the rest of the old warrior's life before and after the war. This will be Maffeo's sixth naval history book.

Paul Barnes 1923 ~ 2020

"Diary of an Airman" – Capt Paul Barnes, USAFR, WW2 Veteran

On February 14th, 2020 my father, Capt Paul Barnes, USAFR, U.S. Army Air Corp WW2 veteran pilot, and career airline pilot with Continental Airlines, passed quietly in his sleep at age 97. He has gone on to the greater heavenly home of our WW2 heroes.

Raised on a dirt-poor homestead in Southern Colorado; he moved to Boulder, CO. and worked as a meat cutter. Then came WW2. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps in February, 1943 and was selected for flight training. He was commissioned as an Army Air Corps pilot in April, 1944. Then the challenges and heroic efforts began; he flew a twin engine cargo plane, the C-46.

Flying over the Atlantic in a twin engine C-46 (imagine crossing the Atlantic in one of these!) with a navigator using the stars and a sextant for navigation. They came close to missing the Azores for their fueling station when the navigator (who my father said graduated in the lower-half of his class) mis-calculated their time of arrival and only found the Azores when they accidentally spotted them through an opening in the clouds; 15 minutes earlier than the navigator had calculated.

Ultimately stationed in the China-Burma-India theatre of operations, he flew missions over the Himalayas and throughout the area. The C-46 had a recognized engineering fault – the carburetor heaters were known to fail and the carburetor to freeze; killing the engine. They learned to be good at flying on one engine. Then, on one mission over the Pangsau Pass between India and Burma, the inevitable happened, both engines failed and they bailed out over the jungle of Burma (the radioman hesitated and got a helpful boot-boost from my dad.) He heroically led his entire crew to a successful bail-out and recovery through the jungles of Burma, in head-hunter territory, to safety behind friendly lines.

They were fortunate to all get out unharmed, and to encounter friendly natives (albeit head-hunters). One night, while they were traveling through the territory, the natives went on a head-hunting mission (unknown to my father and crew) and brought back some trophies to show him and his crew. Though there are no photos of the 'trophies', my father did trade some parachute silk and "salt chits" for native spears and a safe passage to friendly lines. (The natives could trade chits for salt when they assisted downed airmen.)

My father continued war-time flying until his discharge on 10 Jan 46. He then went on with life, raising a family, and a full 30-year career as an airline pilot with Continental Airlines. Like so many unsung heroes of WW2, he hardly mentioned his WW2 service to family and friends until much later in life, when we challenged him. (He also did some Korea service for which we do not have the details, receiving his final service discharge as Capt, USAFR in Dec 1958.)



Due to Covid, he did not receive military Honors at Ft Logan National Cemetery until 14 Aug 20.

Now, the National World War II Museum in New Orleans has his war-time memorabilia and records, and a fully documented "Diary of An Airman", published by family and friends, have all been placed in the museum's "China-Burma-India" Collection.

Wayne Roger Pelaez 1939 - 2020

Captain Wayne Roger Pelaez, USNR (Ret.), age 81, passed away on August 25, 2020, on Orders from his Supreme High Commander, after a short battle with cancer. Born on May 8, 1939, in New York City, he was preceded in death by his parents Joseph G. and Mary Carmen (Jordan) Pelaez. He is survived by his loving wife of fifty-seven years, Eleanor Ann Rutherford (Ellie) Pelaez; his son Randall Wayne (Randy) Pelaez (Mary Lee McInnis), step-grandson Cameron Knapp, all of Gulf Breeze, FL; his brother Edsel (Elaine) Pelaez of Clearwater, FL; and five nieces and nephews.

Wayne began his career with NCIS in Charleston, SC, transferring to Nashville in 1967. He was extremely proud to have served on three Presidential Details. He spent forty-five years as a federal agent with four different agencies. Simultaneously with his federal position, in December 1971, he entered the Office of Naval Intelligence Naval Reserves, which included time spent at Camp LeJeune during Desert Shield.

During his Naval Intelligence career, he had two commands: one at Millington, TN, and the other at Ft. Campbell, KY. During intermittent active duties, he was assigned to ONI in Washington, D.C. to set up a team to declassify information that was twenty-five years or older (with some exceptions.) This was in compliance with President Bill Clinton's Executive Order and set the tone for the rest of the Navy to follow. For this, he was awarded the Meritorious Service Medal. His last six months before his retirement in May, 1999, were spent on active duty at the Defense Intelligence Agency in Washington, D.C.
